It's a work of fiction but taken from true facts about HIV and AIDS and the AIDS industry. If there's any ounce of truth to the research put into this book (as the author claims), everything we have learned about HIV and AIDS has been turned upside down...that HIV does not cause AIDS, that most people die from side effects of AZT and other HAART drugs (Highly active antiretroviral treatment) rather than AIDS itself. This book is an intriguing look at the debate concerning the connection between HIV and AIDS, the

inconsistencies that surround the behavior of the HIV virus and the drugs used to control it, and provides a compelling counter argument for the genesis of the disease of AIDS. I have not personally reviewed all of the supporting materials, but what I have reviewed is consistent with the picture painted by the book. Davis seems to have done his research and he presents a cogent and logical argument about how AIDS and HIV are in no way related, how HIV is poorly understood and may be a benign presence in the body because medical research simply has *not* determined exactly what an HIV positive status actually means, and how drugs meant to "cure" the individual with an HIV positive status killed them instead.

Read this book for yourself and draw your own conclusions. The writing is not an impediment to understanding the concept; Davis explains difficult medical concepts in a clear and straightforward manner that is easy-to-understand.
