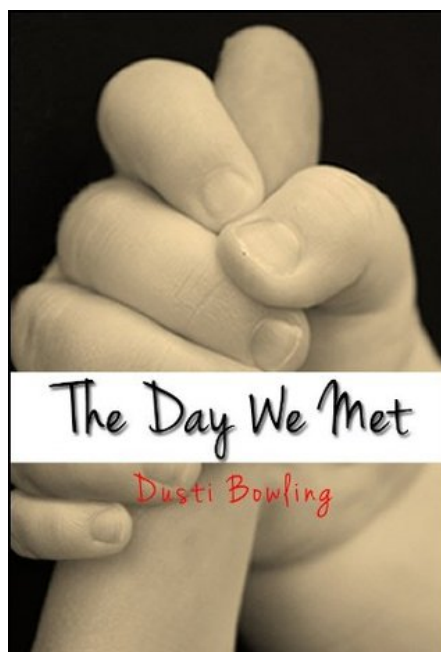




The Day We Met

I bought this while perusing through the list of top rated children's fiction on Amazon. It was only 99 cents, and it was about a high school girl who wasn't sure about hanging with her church friends. Hmmmm, plus it was an independently published book with such good ratings? Sounds interesting. I loaded it before leaving town for work, and didn't come to it in my queue until I had finished a couple other books first. By that time I had forgotten i had even downloaded it. So I began reading the first chapter which takes place at a party, and by the time the main character is in an upstairs bathroom washing some spilled beer off her skirt I was hooked. The story is written in first person, but is straight forward without trying to be "cool." I think the absence of hipster language will give this book a longer shelf life.

Bowling does a great job of writing a believable real life problems story from a Christian worldview without being either cheesy or too R-rated. It isn't preachy and the characters aren't perfect, yet it communicates hope and grace better than most books I've read in this genre. It's also a cautionary tale that I would not hesitate to hand over to even the most sheltered 8th grader. I think it would actually be a great book for a book club of young girls (even guys) to discuss some of the things Lenna faces in the book regarding her faith, friends, boys, judging others and the sanctity of life.

There are a couple nit-picky things I didn't agree with in the book. For instance, I would have had Pastor Ted communicate things little differently with Lenna. I think he could have acknowledged that she did sin but that God was ready to forgive. What makes God's love so amazing is that we are all so undeserving because we are all bent on living lives our own way apart from God's help. Overall, though, I did love the scene and thought Bowling did an amazing job with the interaction between the two characters without being sappy.

This book was a total surprise. I cried several times, and that is not my usual response to teen fiction. I hope Bowling has more books on the way. I'll be looking for them.

There were some things I liked about this book quite a bit. I felt that the voice of the main character was pretty genuine, and the last few chapters were very sensitively written. However, I am not a huge fan of books that start off in the middle and then use flashbacks to get me caught up. I don't feel that the character is established well enough before she gets pregnant--the book blurb tells us she is a "church nerd," but we don't really see that in the text. Her disconnection from church starts even before the Halloween party, but we don't really know why. And while I was glad that the the author skipped the actual scene where she loses her virginity, it would have been good to know more about what is going on in her head--much later she says that she went through with it because of peer pressure, but it takes a long time for that to be established.

The other thing that bothered me was that in one spot the main character admits that she had a choice and she made it, and then in other places she expresses the feeling that God meant for all this to happen; one of the characters says that "everything happens for a reason." I think I understand what the author is trying to say, but I'm not sure the text really conveys that.

I did like the way the author dealt with the topic of abortion and birth defects--the main character's reasoning behind her decision to go through with the pregnancy is clearly conveyed and supports a pro-life stance without getting too much into the various arguments that are often used. It seems appropriate for the character.
