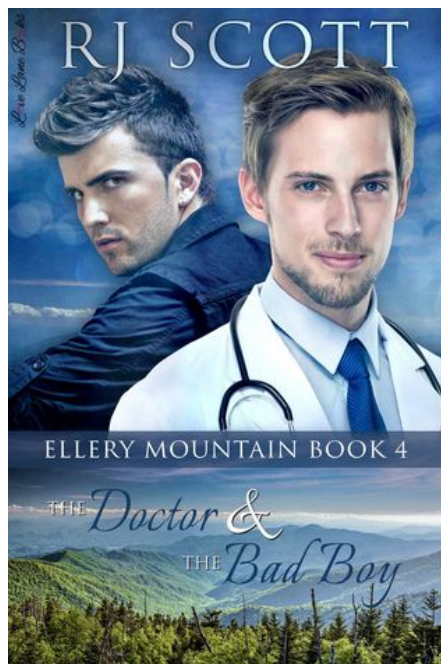




The Doctor and the Bad Boy

Dr. Liam Wolfe removes her appendix,

and Mitch is completely humbled by the handsome doctor. Liam is a terrific person, who helps with various projects in town, and with the returning veteran's home Daniel is opening soon.

We see strong men, devoted and passionate, and beautiful Mitch struggles to stay steadfast in his resolve. He and Liam sneak to get some time alone, and when they do - it's sparks and flames. Once again we head to Ellery Mountain and the ever-growing population of gay men who end up inside this small town. This time we are introduced to the man who will become the sole preoccupation of Dr. Liam Wolfe. Mitchell Askett is no stranger to Ellery, having grown up there and coming from one of its wealthiest families. However, time has not been kind to Mitch or his sister, leaving them both with addictions they must grapple with, unfeeling parents and a lovely child who happens to now be in Mitch's care as he heads to the very cabins of which he is now half owner.

That's right, we finally meet the man who helped Daniel and his mother Brenda out by buying up half the rights to their families luxury cabins. And while Mitch wants to become more than an owner on paper, his little niece is terribly ill and he is plagued by demons from his past that may mean his time in Ellery will not be the safe haven he desires most. When he and Liam meet there is, as always, an instant attraction but Mitch is so very aware of his shortcomings and tries his best to elude the persistent doctor. But Liam has a mind of his own and he wants Mitch, flaws and all and is determined that Mitch at least give him a chance to be the one thing that goes right in Mitch's life—the one thing that stays and puts down roots.

As always, we are talking instant attraction when we discuss these sweet little novellas written by RJ Scott. In this case, I found the normal chase scene to land his man was written with greater restraint than usual. I appreciated how flawed Mitch was and the sensitivity that the author used in writing about his addiction and his genuine remorse over a past that was less than stellar by anyone's measure. The tenderness Mitch showed for both his little niece and his ailing sister was heartfelt and had depth, giving us a keener sense of Mitch's overall character.

In fact, it was Liam who I felt seemed a bit shallow. I came away from this story knowing little about him other than the idea that he loved Mitch and wanted him to stay. All in all, this was a well-rounded story—with a bit more depth than the previous one and characters that were finally not so easily fixed. The addiction didn't magically go away and this made The Doctor and the Bad Boy a much more compelling read in my opinion

Just when you thought Ellery ran out of hot gay men Mitchell Askett rolls into town. Actually, the Askett family was influential in Ellery years ago but moved away to Knoxville. Mitchell has purchased a half ownership in the Ellery Mountain resort and has returned with his niece in tow. Bobbie needs some emergency surgery which is taken care of by Dr. Liam Wolfe. Mitchell has a reputation as a bad boy bed hopping alcoholic and Liam has been feeling left out of the Friday night get togethers being the only single guy left.

This story is part of the Ellery Mountain series of fairly short romance stories and should be read in order or you'll soon get confused with the cast of characters. I liked the way that Liam and Mitchell met at the hospital which made for a nice change as Mitchell met the professional doctor first and the man second. The rumor mill in Ellery is constantly in high gear so Mitchell and the Annabelle's arrival has the town jumping. This story is tight, neat and beautifully written and the getting to know you before falling in love style is RJ Scott at her best. I love the way that Mitchell just poured everything out to Liam and held back no secrets. Mitchell's devotion to his niece and sister was endearing especially with his harrridan of a mother. Mitchell arrives in town, niece in tow, and is immediately thrown into drama as they make an emergency dash to the hospital. Here he meets the gorgeous Liam.

Mitch also meets the group of Ellery friends that we have come to know through the previous books **"Jeez. Was anyone in this town ugly?"** but even when faced with all these wonderful men, it is Liam who sparks something in him.

Mitch is a man with a past, plagued by rumour due to his alcoholism. But in reality is a strong man, taking responsibility for his actions and also taking huge responsibility for his sister and her child. I enjoyed that the story had the group of friends accepting Mitch, not judging or making him prove himself.

There are some misunderstandings, there is some drama and heroics, there are confrontations. But there is also romance, sexy sex and a happy ending!

Let me start with the fact that these series is a series you either like or don't like; there are very diverse opinions on this. Me – I happen to like them. It feels like a comfortable, easy read that has a bit of drama but is mainly focussed on love.

The first three instalments in the series left me anxious for more and also made me curious as each of the three main characters (the three friends from the books – Finn, Daniel and Kiernan) were now paired up with a partner (Max, Luke and Jason). That had me very interested and curious to see how this series would continue seeing the many interesting characters that live in Ellery.

In this fourth book we meet Liam – a doctor working at the town clinic and we also find Mitch – former bad boy, drunk and trouble maker. Having lived in Ellery, when he was younger he returns to share ownership of Ellery Cabins with Daniel and his mum Brenda. Mitch returns after changing his life drastically along with his twelve year old niece. Mitch takes care of Bobbie while Annabelle (his sister) is in rehab.

Despite Liam's first hesitance towards Mitch and his own past, there is an instant attraction between the two guys and Mitch finds himself accepted by the gay friendly community of Ellery and the couple that lives there.

Building a place for himself and Bobbie and his sister for when she comes out of rehab builds a solid relationship between all the guys. We see the relationship between Liam and Mitch easily evolving into more than just friends and you find situations where Mitch and Bobbie are making a life in Ellery settling in their new house and life in general.

Annabelle is joining them in their home when she comes out of rehab and the parents – not totally surprising – make objection about Bobbie living with both Annabelle and Mitch.

So what to say about the story? It reads good and flows nicely but it is kind of shallow...? I didn't really feel a connection with the characters whereas in the other stories I did. Liam and Mitch easily get together and there is not really a big adventure or sparkling way there. There are no surprises or anything. It is hard to sum

up what I think about this story. Disappointed, if I am honest, I guess.

Did I expect too much? Was I too excited upfront?

I love the characters, especially the fact that you see all of them coming back in this story. The companionship between them is great! The sex is hot, as always and the story is easily read.

That being said this story needs to be read in order of the series as too many things wouldn't make sense to read it as a stand alone.

To sum up, I'll give this a rating of three stars mostly because of the easy read and the wonderful characters and because I still really like the men (and women) of Ellery mountain.

There are two sides to every story and I believe everyone deserves a second chance. Mitchell Askett of 'The Bad Boy and the Doctor' is haunted by his past. Everyone judges him, not by who he has become, but by his behavior caused by a series of bad decisions he made in the past. He's aching to make a new start for him, his sister, and his niece. Mitchell takes his savings and buys into the Ellery Mountain Resort and relocates there. He expects to be rejected, like he always has been by everyone in his life, except his sister and niece who love him dearly. He tries to keep his distance from everyone; but fate intervenes, putting Dr. Liam Wolfe directly in his path.

Mitchell can hardly believe how open the people are in Ellery. He's amazed that they don't hold his past against him; they actually encourage his integration into the community, offering support he's never had before. Mitchell is bewildered. At first, doesn't quite know how to react. He soon realizes that he loves the people, especially Liam, and the town; Mitchell finally has hope that things may be all right after all. His niece and sister love it too; they fit almost seamlessly into the friendly town. If it were not for his parents' interference, things would be idyllic, but they are determined to disrupt Mitchell and his family's life and tear them apart. What Mitchell's parents are not expecting is the overwhelming of support he receives from the Ellery Mountain community.

Liam is a good guy and an excellent doctor. He's a bit melancholy lately because his close friends have found their soul mates and are so blissfully happy that it makes him sick. He's glad for them, of course, but it makes him feel even more alone when he watches them together. It overemphasizes the fact that he's still single. When he and Mitchell meet, Liam is thunderstruck at the visceral reaction he has to him and soon realizes that Mitchell is just as affected. Liam is able to see through that bad boy exterior and into the wonderful, loving, considerate man underneath. There are some complications; the first being that his niece is Liam's patient and she comes first, before any feelings Mitchell may have for Liam. But, where there's a will, there's a way and the two men are determined to find it no matter how unlikely it may seem. Soon they are in each others arms, beds, and hearts and there's no turning back.

I liked this book even more than the other Ellery Mountain series books, because these men were determined to do what was best for their family. They put aside their personal feelings to ensure that their relationship didn't interfere with Mitchell's recovery and new start, so important to him, his niece, and his sister. Liam and Mitchell's relationship felt genuine and their loyalty, nurturing, and selflessness endeared them to me immediately and I was steadfastly cheering for them and their relationship. If you like romantic love stories filled with wonderful, realistic, unselfish characters, then you will enjoy this book. Thanks, RJ, for another visit to Ellery Mountain and its lovely residents.
