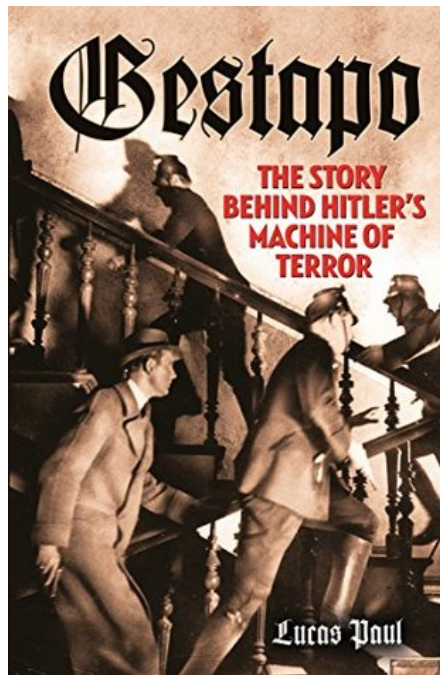




Gestapo: Hitler's Secret Terror Police

A concise and unflinching history of the Gestapo. The latter part of the book seemed to jump around a bit (e.g., from Violette Szabo to Operation Valkyrie to the Warsaw Uprising to Anne Frank) but it was still educational.

This is one of those books that is becoming all too common; it takes information from a number of existing sources, and simply cobbles it together in short tabloid fashion. There is no analysis; no new information. There are huge generalisations, out of date thinking and many factual errors. The book starts off with a very brief history of the Gestapo. The rest of the book - as the author admits - is simply a collection of atrocity stories in rough chronological order. There is no attempt to understand why people joined the organisation; no attempt to understand their place in

society - either in Germany or occupied countries (other than some very dodgy broad brush strokes); no attempt to assess their actual effectiveness.

The Gestapo was a political police force in an increasingly brutal state; what they did was mostly atrocious. If you want a very quick summary of their role, then this book might be useful. But if you want to know who the Gestapo really were, why they did what they did, and how they were seen by outsiders, then you won't find it here. There are other suitable histories that are far better.

When I first started reading this book, I was surprised how short it was. I thought that no way could Saul give anything but a rushed overview in only just over 100 pages (I know GoodReads says 240 pages, but the book actually covers 104 on my device). However, when I was finished reading, I was pleasantly surprised. Saul does a great job of laying out the history and atrocities of the Gestapo without feeling rushed. Most of the focus is directly on the Gestapo itself, with just enough general war history added for readers to understand the context.

Fans of non-fiction, war stories, and true crime should definitely check this one out.

This is a good summary overview of the Gestapo, but didn't quite have enough detail for me. If you didn't know much about them before then this book would be a good place to start. However it doesn't quite live up to the promise of the blurb. What I was hoping for was some analysis of how the Gestapo was formed, where its staff came from and why they joined up.

What you get with this book is a rough chronological history of the Gestapo, and their involvement in the atrocities committed by the nazi state. You also get a series of dramatis personae with pictures and a potted biography. Frankly a lot of this is readily available through wikipedia and other sources. It is collected here for you and presented with a sensible reading order. What it needs more of is the analysis of who these people were and why they ended up in the gestapo.

Over the 12 years of its existence nazi Germany employed tens of thousands of people in the secret police. The East German state would do largely the same thing with even more people over its forty year span. So how did these German states persuade ordinary people to put in place a political police that repressed dissent and removed enemies of the state? This book should try to tell you, but it doesn't.
