The most incredible thing about Angron is that he might be the only traitor Primarch purely fight for freedom (because he's got nothing to lose) and the ascension became the best his choice during the heresy. This is a sterling bundle of stories, and a superb exploration of one of the most interesting characters in the Horus Heresy. Matt Farrer's After Desh'a is easily one of the three best short stories published in the Heresy so far (I would really love to see a full HH novel from Farrer). ADB's Lord of the Red Sands is a great snapshot of Angron, and a smart little statement on the justifications for war and their fallacies. Butcher's Nails is probably the weakest of the three stories, as it is so obviously an ancillary prologue for Betrayer. The story itself is perfectly enjoyable, with both Angron and Lorgar getting some good lines (and demonstrating the change, such as it is, in Angron's character between the stories) and the action is great. But IMO I think it needs to be longer to do the story justice, hence the feeling that it is ancillary to the novel that immediately follows.

Overall, this is a great collection. Read these stories.
