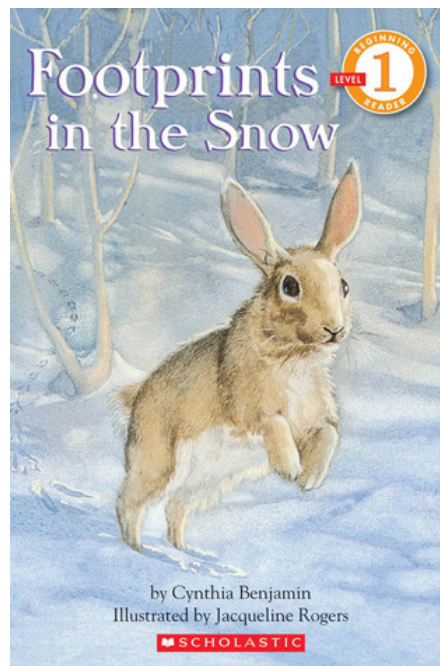




Footprints in the Snow

This is labeled a preschool-Grade 1 book, but I think it would be more for very beginning readers... as it only has two to three words per page and the words are repetitive. However it's a very nice Beginning Science book! it follows "Someone hops" "Someone jumps" "Someone swims" etc "Home" as the picture shows a rabbit, deer, beaver, fish, bear etc going through the snow-lake and then on the page it says "home" shows a winter den-'home' for that animal. Perfect to help teach where these animals go in the winter when snow is on the ground. Very basic reader, with (to me) more to learn with the pictures.
