Hittin' It was such a fun story. Will and Sabrina are perhaps an unlikely couple, but the sizzle between them was definitely off the charts.

As this is a relatively short read, I'm going to let the Cover Description stand without much more details. No need to spoil the story for you.

But I found the concept of a hitman finally finding love a truly unique and entertaining idea. After all, hitmen need love too, right? Add into the mix the fact that he is, at times, so clueless about women – yeah, definitely had me chuckling and rolling my eyes at Will, often. Sabrina is definitely feisty and convinced that love is not for her ever again... but she can't resist Will for very long.

This novella is a reissue and not one at the same time. The author has taken this from a two story book to simply Will and Sabrina's story with some additions. So "if" you've read this one back when it was originally published you might see some changes. I didn't have the experience of reading the earlier version – so my enjoyment of this story was solely based on Will and Sabrina's adventure in love.

If you're looking for a lighthearted, charming and flirty summer read (or anytime really) then Hittin' It should definitely be on your reading list. I would definitely recommend this story for readers that just want some fun served up with their love story.

A Great Summer Read!

Amie Stuart's HITTIN' IT is a great summer read. Just as in NAILED, book one in her MARKED FOR LOVE series, Ms. Stuart delivers a tightly crafted, fast paced story full of humor and intrigue.

Will Collier's retirement is official. He's just completed his last job for the family business, and none too soon. He's tired, jaded, and has pretty much lost his sense of humor. He stinks at relationships but that just might have something to do with the fact that, in his line of work, revealing the truth to a woman could very well get her killed. That's if she doesn't run for the hills first. All the years working as a hit man for his father not only zeroed out his social skills but pretty much sucked the life right out of him. His plan: take the few million he's saved, buy a beach house, and fish. Alone. The problem: he meets Sabrina Walker.

Sabrina is a gypsy, following the Renn-Faire circuit reading Tarot cards. Home is a beat up van and her dog Scamp. She has plenty of secrets but they are tucked away in her journals and that's where they're going stay. The problem: her ancient van breaks down along a deserted highway somewhere in Texas. The bigger problem: Will Collier comes to her rescue

It's not in his nature to help anyone. Will's not a touchy-feely guy. But Sabrina is beautiful and alone and if he doesn't help out there's no telling what will happen to her. Sabrina doesn't accept help from anyone, much less a cranky, socially stunted man no matter how hot he is. But she's desperate and willing to take her chances.

When Will's last job unexpectedly comes back to haunt him, he and Sabrina are on the run, stuck with each other until the danger is over.

This was a fast read, a bit darker than Nailed, but I enjoyed it nonetheless. Will is cranky, brash, and always sticking his foot in his mouth. Despite his inability to woo a woman, he's trying his best with Sabrina. She, on the other hand, has kept everyone at arm's length for so long she's not sure how to be in a relationship. But she'd sure like to clobber Will over the head with that foot he keeps sticking in his mouth.

If it weren't for the first person confusion in "Screwed" this would have been a five star review. That bit threw me off and, even though I eventually got used to it, I think there may have been a more effective way of pulling it off. Maybe putting names at the beginning of the chapter when the voice changed? I mean, I could **see** that the voice changed, of course, but...I don't know. I'm not opposed to first person on general principle, it just seem to stall the story each time the voice flipped and the reader had to re-adjust how they were seeing the world. That's all. Purely personal preference, I suppose.

None of that did anything to dull the excitement of the characters, though. Stuart populated her world with fascinating people who you wanted to follow. I wanted Will to read more of Sabrina's diaries so I could learn more about her too! I wanted to hear more about Will's family, hear more about his background with the bitchy exes. I loved the world that was built around a family of assassins and how they make their way in the world. Worldbuilding only works if you care enough about the people who populate that world. Stuart succeeded in making me care about them. Of course, making me care about the main characters is really a basic characteristic of a good writer. I know it may seem like it is complex, but that is because so many writers can't make that happen. A truer sign of a complex writer, however, makes you care about the secondary and tangential characters as well. They aren't just props for the main characters to move around, but they have three dimensional thoughts and motivations of their own. I got that from the secondary characters in both "Screwed" and "Hooked". The characters weren't just there as roadblocks (cockblocks?) but could easily be turned into heroes and/or heroines in their own right. Well, maybe not Mark Green. I really don't like that one.

Even though I liked all four of the main characters, I think I preferred "Hooked". Don't get me wrong, I loved Will and Sabrina (and Will....did I say that already?). But, I really thought John and Tish had more chemistry. And while I really liked Tish, she seemed to irritate me in a way that made me wonder why I cared so much. That isn't to say that Will and Sabrina weren't good, because they most definitely were. There was a real depth there, definitely more serious, and not just because of the circumstances that led to them being on the run. Each of them had (or seemed to have) lived more life, had more to overcome which made it nicer when they found each other. John and Tish seemed to be more fun. I was equally happy that they found each other. And, even though there was the drama in John's past that made him commit to the non-lying, it still seemed more light hearted and fun.

Overall, very good book with two very strong stories. I can't wait to read more from her.
