That exultant feeling of being in a world far divorced from reality where good overcomes evil and the good guys have a beautiful and trusting harmony with each other. I had that feeling with this book. Even though each of the children turns out to have some kind, mentor adults who would step in to rescue them (in some ways a cop-out by Forsyth), for one reason after another the children do not get to take a step back and let the adults handle it.

This book is pure action: fantastic swords and sorcery style action with cooperative rhythms between the four and their allies (such as Jack who I would have like to have seen even more of). I could pick the lack of realism to bits but I think that would be missing the point of what was a fast-paced and positively cast end to the impossible quest.

Much as I like brevity however I still wonder if the whole quest would have been better as one book. But it was worth a read in either case!
