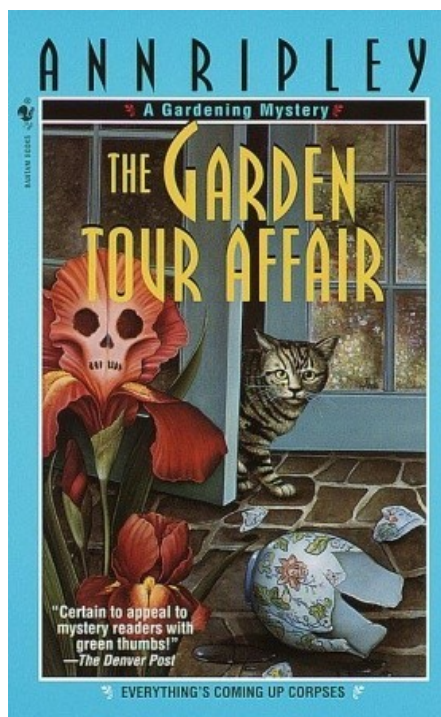

The Garden Tour Affair by Ann Ripley takes place away from Louise Eldridge's home near Washington, D.C. Eldridge takes her television show, and her family, on a road trip to Connecticut's historic Litchfield Falls Inn. In hopes to mix family time with work.

Immediately the proprietor of the inn takes a tumble down the stairs, and it does not seem a mere accident. Then two people are murdered along the hiking trails not far from the inn. Readers may need to keep notes to keep track of the cast of characters, and suspects, in this cozy mystery, but it is worth the effort.

Ripley also adds her signature threads of horticultural intrigue, this time with a story of a hybrid iris and it's true ownership. Would an iris be worth killing over?

The book contains a selection of Ripley's nonfiction writing every few chapters, as well. If you like cozy mysteries you will enjoy The Garden Tour Affair. If you enjoy gardening, you will doubly be easily immersed in the story.

Just a caution, Ripley's books have older copyrights and may be difficult to find in print.
