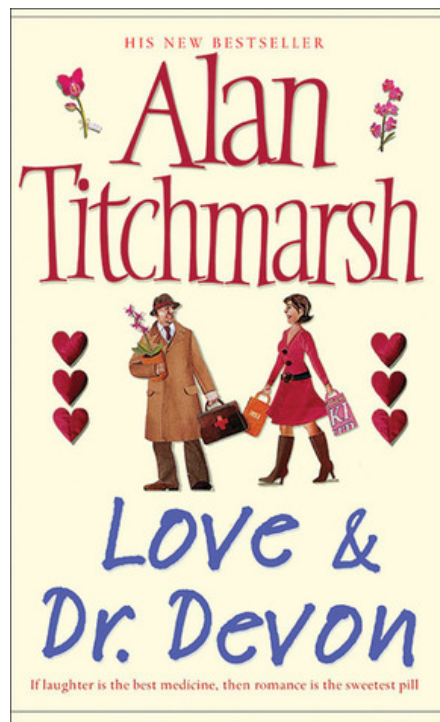




Love & Dr. Devon
