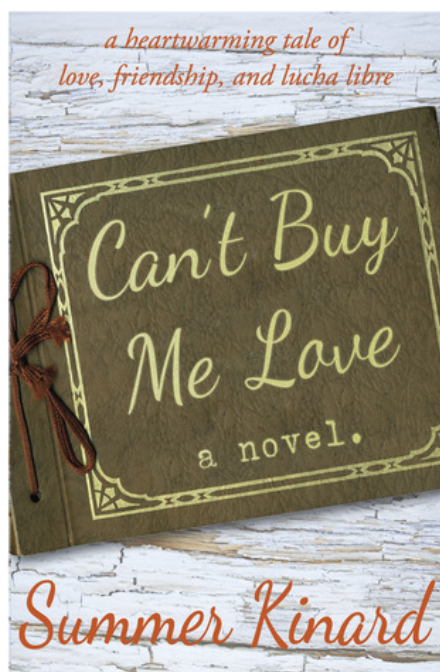

I received this book free through a Goodreads giveaway and regret to give it only 2.5 stars. It's a quick read coming in at 267 pages and while it did have some nice aspects about it, I unfortunately just didn't love this book. It's a unique idea to use the Freegan lifestyle as part of the story, and has enlightened me on the subject. But to give some constructive criticism, I thought for this size book there were far too many characters. I had a hard time remembering who was who. What added to this frustration for me was the use of similar names. For example, Perla and Percy, who were in the same woman's group. Their names being so similar I would have to pause to remember who each one was. Likewise, Ma and Mom (the one character's two mothers). I thought it would have helped if she used distinctive nicknames for them. Another thing that I personally struggled with was the numerous foreign words and phrases. Not knowing the language, I unfortunately felt as though I was missing parts of the story and thereby disrupting its flow. The book also felt overly busy mentioning so many underlying topics and viewpoints that I believe it took away from the truly charming part of the story. I felt that it was almost there, but fell slightly short.

Obviously, since I'm the author, I love this book! I love the characters, I love the setting, and I love the story. I'm writing this review for those of you who might want to know more about the inspiration for the rich friendships that, along with the love story, make up the heart of the novel.

The core friendships in the book center around the women of Fructus, a women's group that meets every week to talk about their lives in a safe, nurturing, challenging, and fun environment. I chose the name based on the Ave Maria, "et [and] benedictus [blessed is] fructus [the fruit] ventris tui [of your womb]." I wanted to nod toward the Catholicism that is important to several of the characters, but I also wanted to evoke a connection to the womb. Good friendships are where we are reborn.

When I was in seminary, the liveliest, funniest, most healing experience I had was in my first year Hebrew study sessions. I not only learned better and deeper with that diverse group of friends, but Cheryl, Rodney, Rachel, and the others made me laugh. I understood then that to have a mouth filled with that kind of laughter was to have a mouth filled with God. Cheryl and Rodney and some of the others went on to be pastors in the Methodist Church and Holiness traditions. Rachel was an undergrad rabbinical student. While we were learning to read backwards and figure out the roots of words that had grown into our faiths, we managed to really see each other. That kind of love is what I look for in friends, and what I wanted to share in writing about the women of Fructus.

Some of the characters are a nod to specific persons in my real life, but I think I'll keep those references to myself for now. What I want you to know is that it's possible to really be seen and also loved, that it's possible to be healed. I want you to eat and drink and relax with the story, and above all, I want you to enjoy it! If it makes you laugh, I hope that laugh sinks in good. I hope you go on your way thinking, "I was made for joy."
