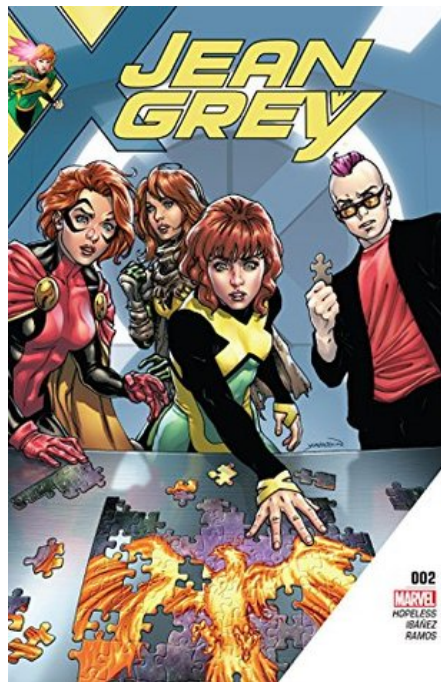

The time-displaced X-Men continue to be in some of my favorite series from Marvel, and Jean Grey's solo series is no exception. I really enjoyed the first issue, and the second issue managed to pump me up even more.

Jean has gone to Beast and friends for help on her vision of the Phoenix, but the science buddies are skeptical as to whether or not Jean's vision was real since they have no data showing the Phoenix is anywhere close to coming and making contact with Jean. Unsatisfied with their lack of help, Jean contacts those she knows that have been hosts for the Phoenix, which was definitely nice to see since I was unaware anyone else had held the Phoenix, other than Rachel.

Through her talk with Illyana, Rachel, Quentin and Peter over telepathy, Jean discovers that Hope, another host, is in peril and goes to save her. The other four soon meet up with them and help Jean and Hope battle their way out of the Reavers' stronghold, where many, MANY Reavers reside. In the battle, Quentin gives Jean some insight into how the Phoenix has affected each of them by letting her see the damage each of their minds holds due to the Phoenix (save Illyana's mind), which led to a very trippy but fascinating aspect of the comic, and made me hope that we will be seeing a lot of interactions between these six characters again since I loved their dynamics.

It was also rather hilarious to see Jean, Hope, and Rachel all standing side by side when they are characters who have very similar looks to them.

The art for the series itself is something I find myself liking a little bit more than X-Men Blue due to the detail each character is given, as well as the consistency.

I did like how the series will be exploring Jean's crisis at not wanting to end up like the Jean Grey that everyone else knows, as well as her want of a future where she won't have to endure hosting the Phoenix within herself. Because of this, she leaves the other five in order to find the one she thinks can help - Namor.

There's a lot to dig about this series, and I'm super pumped for where the rest of this journey is going to go. It is a little weird how this current story feels very separate from the X-Men Blue story current going on, but the way I see it is that this must be happening after the current arc/issue of X-Men Blue, more so than before.
